SUDA BAY WAR CEMETERY, Greece

Location:

Suda Bay is on the northern coast of Crete, and Suda Bay War Cemetery is at the north-western corner of the Bay, 5 kilometres east of Hania (or Khania) and 3 kilometres north of the Hania (or Khania) - Rethymnon - Heraklion road. The cemetery is in an olive grove and is well signposted from the main road.

**Historical
Information:**

Suda Bay, on the northern coast of Crete, provides the only natural large anchorage in the island and one of the best harbourages of the Eastern Mediterranean. The first German parachutists and glider regiments landed on the Akrotiri Peninsula, the Northern part of the bay, where after desperate fighting they managed to infiltrate, eventually joining up with other units which landed in the West. The small village of Suda suffered heavy damage during this battle. Buried in the cemetery are those who were killed during the operations in Crete, many of whose graves are not identified. This is due to the fact that the German occupying forces moved many of the remains from their graves in the fighting areas into four large burial grounds, which they called British Military Cemeteries, and in so doing lost the identities of the casualties. The graves were moved into the war cemetery by 21 and 22 Australian War Graves Units from burial grounds and other sites in various parts of the island. The special memorials commemorate men known to have been buried in certain groups of graves but whose actual graves within those groups cannot be exactly determined. The memorials therefore are inscribed "Buried near this spot". The other special memorial bears the inscription "Believed to be". Those whose graves are not identified are commemorated by name on the Athens Memorial to the men of the land forces of the British Commonwealth who lost their lives during the campaigns in Greece and Crete in 1941 and 1944-1945, in the Dodecanese Islands in 1943-1945 and in Yugoslavia in 1943-1945, and have no known grave. This stands in Phaleron War Cemetery, Athens.

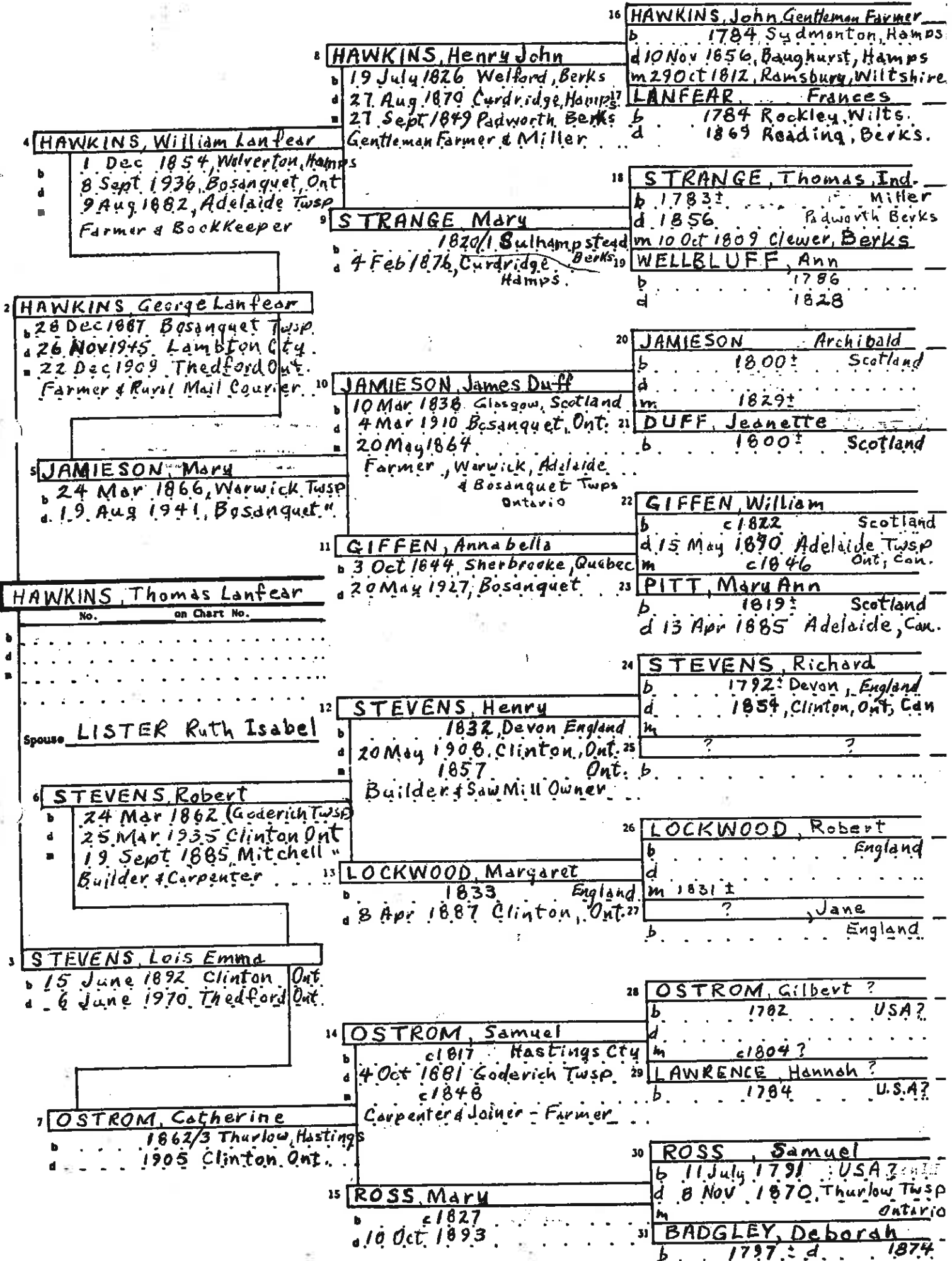
Everyone will be home for Christmas. Do have a happy and wonderful Christmas and may good fortune be with you in 1995.

Dear Tom,

I have casted around, but to date cannot find the positive answer to my theory of the registers of Old Burghclere and Sidminton as separate identities to those of Kingsclere during the late eighteenth century. It is assumed by most that these two parishes were always part of Kingsclere parish, although I know that there were separate registers during the seventeenth century, as I have seen them at Winchester. Anyhow, I shall still pursue this course. Therefore, at present, I cannot offer you proof of your John Hawkins' baptism in 1784. Yet I have had some success at Winchester, through the Kingsmill Estate Records.(No. 303) - Leases.

"22 March 1771. Article of Agreement for Lease from ROBERT KINGSMILL of Sidminton Esq. and ELIZABETH his wife to JOSEPH TANNER of Wellford, Berks, yeoman, and JOHN HAWKINS of Crafton Wilts, yeoman, of Sidminton Farm and Warren Farm with barns, Lands belonging also Milletts Meadow, Cowmarsh Coppice with 1½ acres and lately purchased by ROBERT KINGSMILL from CHARLES WYMONDSALE lying in Sidminton and Litchfield and late in the tenure of RICHARD DIGWEED excepting part of West Field on the west side of the road from Sidminton Mansion House to Newbury, now sown with wheat and part of Eastfield, adjoining the Pond containing about 3 acres as now staked out for separation from the rest of the field, also excepting timbers, right of hunting etc. To hold for fourteen years from Michaelmas next. Rents of £320 yearly, £20 per acre of meadow ploughed up, and carriage of five chaldron of coals from Newbury to Sidminton House yearly. Clauses for repairs, husbandry, etc.

Therefore, this lease gave John Hawkins and Joseph Tanner the occupation of Sidminton and Warren Farms for the period from Michaelmas 1771 until Michaelmas 1785. That John died as lessee, in occupation of the farms, is shown by the 1788 account which I sent you last time. Therefore John had renewed his lease in 1785, possibly for a further seven years, as leases were for either seven, fourteen or twentyone years. It is not known whether Tanner and Hawkins farmed the lands as partners or if Tanner merely financed Hawkins, possibly as his proprietor and purchasor, as each man had his superior in those days, and the proprietor and purchasor was his patron, normally putting up the money to finance his protegé in his business endeavour.

What we have here, however, is definitely a Hawkins-Tanner connection, which, in itself, must go a long way towards proving John Hawkins junior's parentage (I believe you said that he was related to the Tanners). Furthermore, we have the evidence that John Hawkins senior was living in Crafton, Wilts, in 1771. So, armed with this information my wife and I proceeded to the Wiltshire Record Office at Trowbridge, a journey which took two and a quarter hours. The procedure at Trowbridge, once we found the place, is vastly different from Hampshire. There is no such place in Wiltshire called Crafton, and what was recorded in the Kingsmill records as his name must have been in fact Grafton. There are two Graftons - East and West Grafton - and next to each other. Unfortunately, East Grafton, being the only one of the two to have a church, did not begin its registers until 1844, when the church was built. However, prior to that year both the Graftons were in the parish of Great Bedwyn, where the registers began in 1559.

The first priority was to search the calendars of wills, of which the most difficult thing was to discover the jurisdiction which covered East Grafton and Great Bedwyn. This happened to be the Dean of Sarum and a search through the calendars for Hawkinses between the middle of the sixteenth century until 1858 brought forth eleven entries:

The one which took my interest greatly was that of Robert Hawkins, 1779, and kept this particularly for reference. I then ordered the parish registers for Great Bedwyn

1740. At first I searched around the latter period in the hope that John Hawkins, jnr. may have been baptised there instead of at Sidmonton, this being his father's own parish. The only reference to a John Hawkins' baptism was for the son of William and Elizabeth Hawkins dated 9.4.1786. Obviously this is not your John Hawkins. My attention then was directed towards the writings of the rector on the last pages of the register. In 1761 he mentioned a loan to Richard Sheppard of The Brayl from Old Bennells Charity Money and named the Trustees as Thomas Tanner, Thomas Choules, Edward Tanner, Edmund Munday and Henry Bailey. In 1792 there was mention of William Tanner as Churchwarden, and in 1779 among the Trustees of Hungerford's Charity were Thomas Hawkins and Edward Tanner.

Now I decided to search the baptisms from 1720 to 1755 in the hope that I could find John Hawkins, snr. The Hawkins' baptised during this period were:

It would appear that the John baptised 1745 may have been your John Hawkins, snr. Therefore I consulted the will of Robert Hawkins 1779. There was little in it to clarify the situation. He named his son John as executor and willed to him his beat feather bed, bedstead and furniture, furnace, clock, tea-table, jack, fowelling piece, his suit of mourning clothes and £50. To his son William the rest of his wearing apparel excluding light colour 'schul' cloth (which he gave to his son Robert), his freehold house and garden in 'Ramally' and £10. To Robert he gave £20. and to his daughter Mary Dunning he gave his linen, two silver teaspoons, a dutch oven, box iron, clamps and stand and his wife's wearing apparel. There is no mention that his son John lived in Hampshire while I found in the marriage entries the marriage of John Hawkins to Jane Hawkins dtd. 15.11.1779 (although this could have been any of the four)

Dear Tom,

As requested I have searched for evidence of your John Hawkins of Sidmanton in order to corroborate one or the other of the present theories. Unfortunately, to date I have not been wholly successful, but hopefully there are a lot of sources left to investigate. Although at first I was of the impression that John was the son of James of Baughurst, I strongly suspect the validity of your view that John was the son of John of Sidmanton. It is my concern that we must attempt to support this view with documented evidence or conversely eliminate it.

My report to date is as follows (time includes travelling time):-

Hampshire Record Office, Winchester

I have searched various sources including Wills of the Flower family and came up with the following from British Records Association No. 1473 (42M66)

I seemed aware that I may be covering ground that you have already covered, could you please give me details of all the facts that you know of the Flowers and the Hawkins connection.

My Own Records

I hold records of the Manor of Manydown plus some tithe apportionments among my own records. You already have details of John Hawkins of Baughurst tithes also William Flower is accounted for in the same tithe apportionment. I searched the Manydown records which includes the parishes of Wootton St. Lawrence, Baughurst and Hannington for any mention of Mrs. Letitia Dicker, but although the Dickers are greatly recorded at Hannington, there was no mention of this woman.

Reading University (Wellington Estate Records)

I could find no document relating to the Flower and Hawkins connection here. I hoped the Manor of Inhurst would have been accounted for in these records, but unfortunately the interest here only dates from 1832 when the Duke of Wellington purchased Wolverton Estate therefore this source of enquiry proved fruitless. ✓

Winchester Public Library

I searched through the local collection at Winchester and may have found a few helpful sources among the Hampshire Marriage Allegations for Licences:-

Burghclere

I decided we weren't getting very far with this research on property basis so I had a rethink of the whole situation. Now, you say that John and Mary Hawkins lived at Sidmonton and had children baptised at Kingsclere, but John Hawkins, the younger, was born at Sidmonton in 1784 but with no baptism, apparently. I had not thought of this before but I too have a similar lost ancestor in the same area, Joshua Woods was born in 1791, his parents were Burghclere people and had children baptised at Burghclere until the early 1780's. Joshua married Ann Webb at Burghclere church in 1816 and both his children were born at Sidmonton but baptised at Kingsclere. Now in that very same area are two churches, separate from Kingsclere and Burghclere. There is a church at Sidmonton Court (now owned by Andrew Lloyd-Webber) and another about a mile away at Old Burghclere. It appears to me that these two churches must have held their own registers during the period of the 1780's and 1790's. I believe both John Hawkins and Joshua Woods (and his sister Harriet Woods) were baptised in one or the other of these churches. My wife and I decided we would take a trip out and look round these churches and churchyards. Unfortunately, Sidmonton Court is private therefore there is no access, but Old Burghclere church still stands even though dilapidated and we looked around the graveyard where the head-stones of people who died in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries were prominent. There is no John Hawkins mentioned there, although the names of Pavey and Pascoe were plentiful. We spoke to a lady there who was much concerned with the restoration of the church, and she told us that Andrew Lloyd-Webber has turned Sidmonton Court church into a concert hall, and she has no knowledge of the registers. However, I intend to pursue this line further, for I firmly believe that our lost ancestors were recorded in one or the other of these church registers which are not at Winchester.

Hampshire Record Office

I searched through the Kingsmill Estate Records because the Kingsmills used to own Sidmonton Court in the past. These were only catalogues, but I did come across this reference:-

1440 (1781 - 1789) Account Book Entitled '1788 Account of Bills Paid' containing Accounts of John Hawkins for Sidmonton Estate payments and disbursements and receipts, settled yearly with Robert Kingsmill, 1781 - 1789; account of money received, 1788; and bills paid by Robert Kingsmill, 1788-1789.

Quarto Book. Receipt, 19 January, 1788, by Richard Rownsend to Mary Hawkins, administratrix of John Hawkins, deceased, for the balance of account, enclosed.

Now as this was a Saturday, researchers are not allowed to order documents on that particular day, therefore on my next visit I shall order this document number 1440, also there is a series amongst the Kingsmill Estate Records pertaining to Sidmonton Leases and Copyholds, 1557-1818. If John Hawkins held copyhold land then there may be chance that his grants will be recorded and he may mention his heirs. Perhaps this way we might be able to find if your John Hawkins was the son of John Hawkins of Sidmonton. I shall let you know the outcome.

In reply to your question re contacting Andrew Lloyd-Webber personally, I would not think this is a good idea as I was told that he ^{inherited} ~~inherited~~ Sidminton House from the previous owners and the church was already empty. I shall endeavour to contact the rector of Burghclere and on my next visit to Winchester do some more snooping there.

My visit to Tröwbridge this time was wholly taken up by searching the manorial records. Apparently, I learned this time, that there is not only East and West Grafton in the parish of Great Bedwyn, but also a hamlet called Crofton which may be the Crafton mentioned in the deed of Sidminton 1771. Great Bedwyn came under the Lords of Savernake Forest which was a massive estate. There were many bundles connected with that estate in the record office and sifting through them I came up with the following that may be of interest.

With regard to the manorial records there seems to be more Tanner records than Hawkins. There doesn't seem to be any proof either way. The leases at Crofton show a Robert Hawkins in 1709 and 1726, could this be the father of John Hawkins or perhaps his father? With the connection of Crofton with Crafton, the Sidmonton records 1771 would appear to link your John Hawkins with the one born in 1745. There was mention in the late seventeenth century of a certain person called Widdings from Sidmountaine in Kingsclere in the manorial records for Crofton, but I could find no connection with this and the property held by Robert Hawkins. Perhaps it was just coincidence.

I have ordered a copy of a detailed map of Great Bedwyn which I will forward to you in due course, the cost of which I will have to let you know at the time.

Will you let me know what you would like me to do next? Do you consider that your John Hawkins, senior was the son of Robert and Mary for which there can be no positive proof for the time being? If you wish me to search the parish registers, etc., further, just let me know.

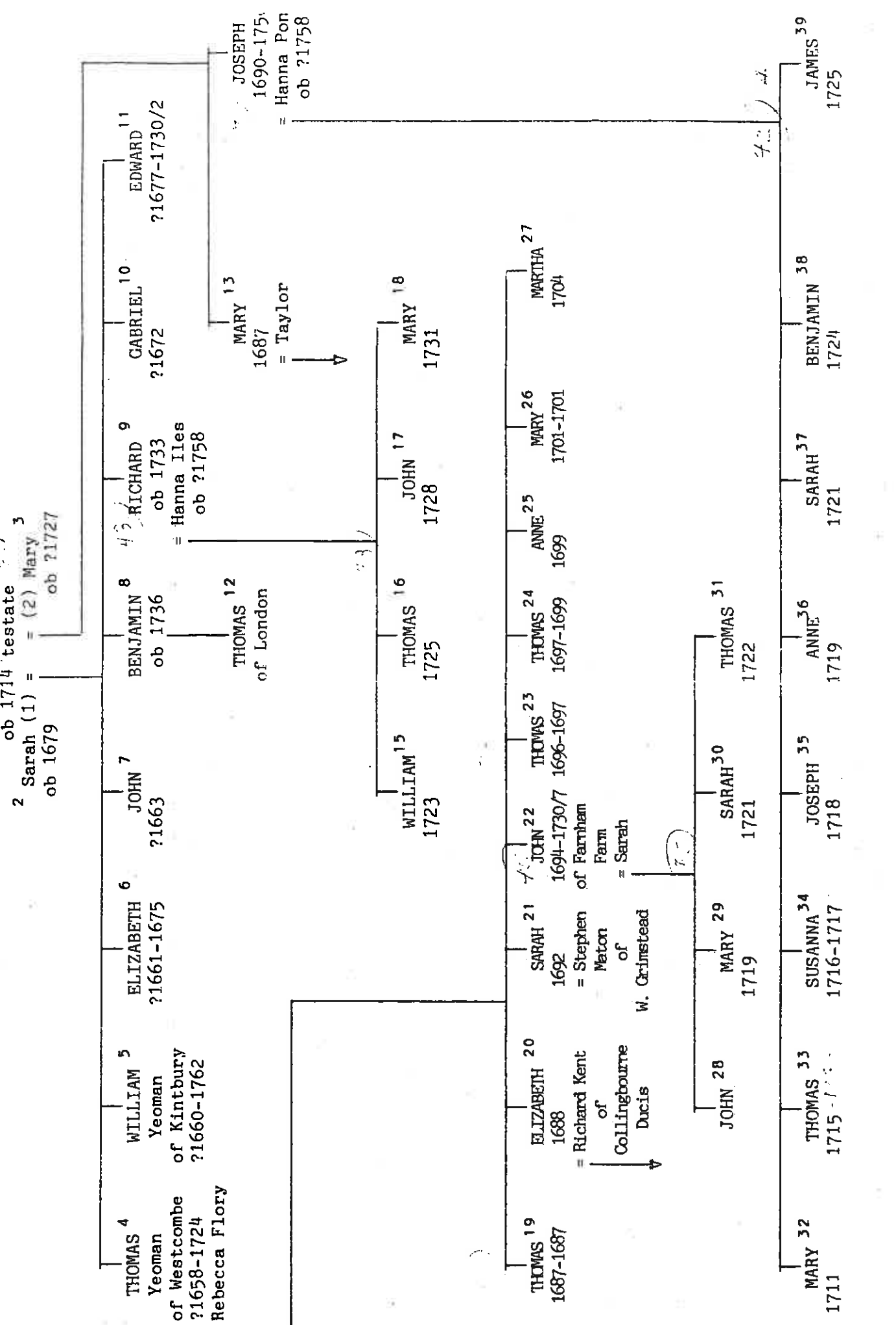

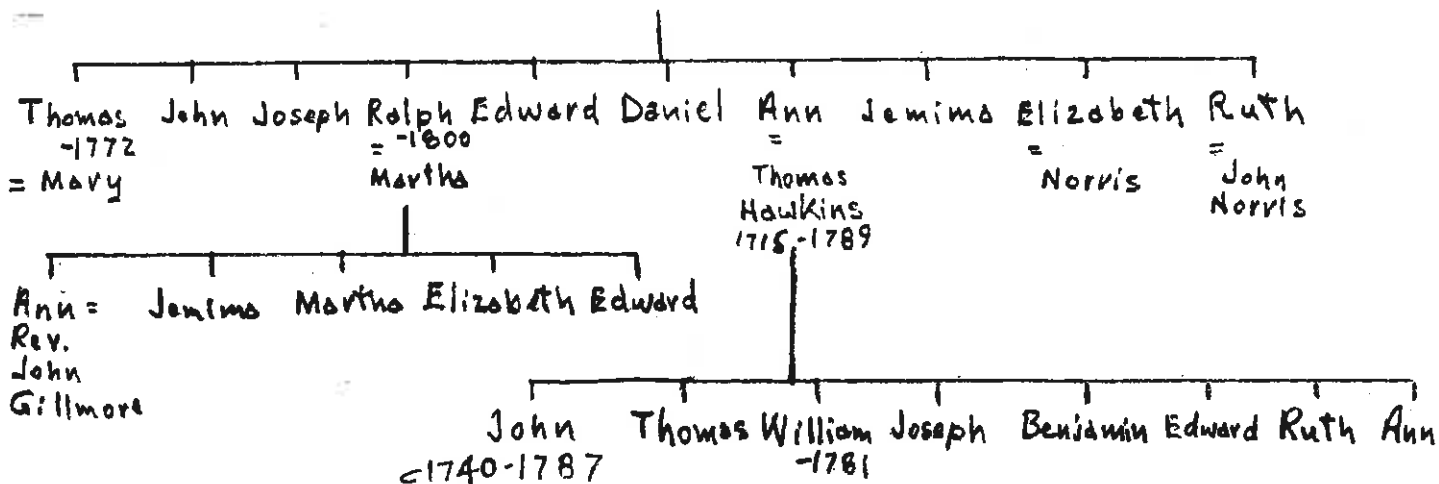
