Mr Moorhead, who is conducting research into new records of Republican coins at the British Museum, said that the Roman coin was one of the most exciting finds he has seen in the last three years. Mr Langford, who has been using his metal detector for the past seven years, took his coin, along with another Iron Age silver coin of Eppillus to the West Berkshire and Oxfordshire Finds Liaison Officer, Anni Byard, so she could officially record them. She iconfirmed the Iron Age coin was only one of 11 that have been recorded in the UK and suspected the Roman coin, a Republican silver denarti, was quite rare. After contacting Sam Moorhead, National Finds Adviser for Ancient Coins with the Portable Antiquities Scheme, the

"This new coin suggests that some of these Republican coins were arriving in Britain before Claudius invaded with his legions in AD 43." He added: "What makes the coin even more interesting is that it is in almost mint condition. Most Republican denarii found

THE FAMILY of a Tadley man whose life was saved twice by staff at Basingstoke Hospital have paid tribute to the care he received.

Harry Langley suffered from Guille Barrie Syndrome, which affects the lungs and had been in and out of Basingstoke hospital for several years.

He eventually died last year aged 57 but his family say they will never forget the skill shown by the doctors and nurses who treated him in Intensive Care.



LAWES, WILLIAM GEORGE (1839-1907), missionary, was born on 1 July 1839 at Aldermaston, Berkshire, England, son of Richard Lawes, tailor, and his wife Mary, née Pickover. Educated in a village school at Mortimer West End. he was apprenticed for six years and in 1858 volunteered for service with the London Missionary Society. He was trained at Bedford and two weeks before ordination on 8 November 1860 he married Fanny Wickham; on 23 November they sailed for the Pacific.

Lawes was posted first to Savage Island (Niue), where in 1868 he was joined by his brother Frank. On 15 January 1872 he began a furlough during which he travelled thirteen thousand miles in Britain lecturing on the missions. In April 1874 he sailed for New Guinea and in November settled at Port Moresby with his wife and children as the first permanent European residents of Papua. Despite attacks of fever which decimated his Polynesian teaching staff and killed his youngest son, Lawes became an expert in the Motuan language and a respected friend of all the south coast tribes. His first European colleague, appointed in 1876, left when his wife became ill but in

1877 James Chalmers [q.v.] arrived, and early in 1878 Lawes left for England on furlough. In four years he had started eleven new mission stations and produced the first

book in a Papuan language.

Lawes was then a public figure. Australian miners in Port Moresby in 1878 sought his return to smooth the relations with natives. From that time his unrivalled knowledge of Papua was in constant demand. Soon after his return in 1881 he helped the exploring parties of 1583, and in 1884 served as interpreter for the Protectorate proclamation by James Elphinstone Erskine [q.v.]. Lawes and his wife went to Sydney as Erskine's guests in H.M.S. Nelson and then toured Victoria and New South Wales. Since 1872 he had fought abuses of the Pacific labour trade and provided much of the ammunition for the work of Erskine's uncle on the subject in the House of Commons.

In 1885 Lawes travelled round the Papuan coast as unofficial adviser to Sir Peter Scratchley [q.v.]. Lawes's Grammar and Vocabulary of Language spoken by Motu Tribe, New Guinea was also published in 1885 and in May 1886 he went on furlough, returning in October 1887. Despite differences with the government secretary he was in demand as an adviser to the colonial government of Sir William MacGregor. Lawes had many helpers at his mission but its monopoly was soon eroded by the arrival of other sects and the delineation of spheres

of influence.

In 1891 Lawes visited England and toured the Australian colonies as a lecturer in 1892, Soon after his return he decided to hand the administration of the mission to a younger colleague and to concentrate on a new training college at Vatorata where he served for ten years. In 1894 he was awarded a doctorate of divinity by the University of Glasgow on MacGregor's recommendation. The murder of Chalmers in 1901 was a serious blow and in 1906 Lawes retired. He left Port Moresby in March and settled at Sydney where he died on 6 August 1907. He was survived by his wife and three of their seven sons. His son Frank served as a government officer in the protectorate and colony; when he died in 1894 MacGregor described him as one who knew and sympathized with the natives

Although Lawes travelled widely and understood his people he was more scholar and administrator than pioneer. His partnership with the adventurous Chaimers was almost an ideal combination.



Dear Mrs Stanley

I am writing to you at the suggestion of Polly Lawrence who thinks you might be able to shed some light on my husband's family who lived in the Baughurst area.

We have been researching both our family histories for about twelve years and after my mother-in-law died in 1993 we found many scraps of paper with snippets of information on them about members of her family. Unfortunately she had never talked to us about these people and so we have been trying to prove whether they were correct ever since her death.

One of the notes was as follows - Aunt Ellen Webb, Baughurst. She ran the tea shop marque. A relation, Mrs Porter owned a Pub down the road, New Inn.

We know that Ellen Rebecca Lawrence married James Webb in 1891 and that Ellen's mother Rebecca was living with them at that time. We also think that James Webbs mother was living at the New Inn with her married daughter. We have also found the graves in Baughurst church yard of Ellen Webb who dies in 1929 and those of Ellen's parents - James Lawrence and Rebecca (nee Blunden). With grateful thanks to you for the helpful information you provided just before Christmas I thought I should let you know that I have now been able to verify that my gt.gt.gt.grandfather George Leavey was born in Sherborne St John and his parents were Peter and Hannah Lavy.


Fairly quickly I was able to establish that the George buried at Sherborne St John in 1831 was married to Sarah before Isabella had died so as you expected that ruled him out. I then began to wonder if the George you had shown as baptised in 1779 might be my ancestor but could not find clear evidence of any connection.

The breakthrough came this week when I obtained a copy of the revised Index to 1851 Census which showed that my ancestor the head of the Levy family in Beauworth/Cheriton was then 73 and had been born in Sherborne St John. This clearly tied in with your information which also named his parents and probable grandparents.

Thank you again for your help and so you can see how this has been so helpful to my research I enclose a copy of the updated part of my family tree.

I like some of the new bands, but prefer to listen to 'old rock', which is far better than the new rock music. I was never a great fan of the 'King' - Elvis Presley - but I like some of his songs such as 'Don't be Cruel' and 'I Don't Care if the Sun Don't Shine', which I have on CD. I recently watched a couple of television programmes featuring his '68 Comeback Special' and 'Aloha from Hawaii' concerts. He died at Graceland in August 1977 and today his house is the second most visited house in the United States after the White House. Over half a million fans visit each year and to some it is an act of religious faith with candlelight vigils.

I am also involved in local politics and am a member of the Labour Party, attending meetings of the local branch and have met several EMPs from the European Parliament at a forum in Basingstoke. I also take an interest in the Town Council and the present planning talks and hope to become a Council member in the future.

I feel that we have to be aware of what is happening around us and do our best for the good of us all with God's guidance.





DR DAVID Lipscomb died the way he enjoyed every-on October 30 after a short thing he did. How we shall illness. He was just 50.

On Monday, his friends and colleagues packed St Andrew's Church, Sherborne St John, to say their last farew-

As autumn sunshine suffused its ancient walls, we reflected on the shock of suddenly losing so young and fine a man.

We thought about the enormous contribution he made to the life of the North Hampshire Hospital and of his 15 years of distinguished service as Consultant Chest Physi-

Trained at Guy's Hospital and moving swiftly up the ladder to Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge, David was appointed to our hospital in 1980, being elected a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians in 1988.

Many thousands of local people will be grateful for his professional skill and sensitivity. A generation of doctors in training have gained from his clear teaching. He was an exceptionally good doctor.

We recalled how fit and healthy David had always been, living every moment, whether in his work, playing golf, organising a cricket match or out racing his beloved keelboat, as he did just two weeks before he died.

How we loved him for his open nature, his energy and miss his wise counsel and his warm generous friendship.

We remembered how, at the end of his life, knowing what was to come, he faced it with a rare courage.

Illness did not diminish him: he died as he had lived.

We knew too how David had centred his life upon his wife Isobel and their three young daughters.

We came to grieve with them and to offer our heartfelt love and sympathy. And as we filed out into the sunshine we knew he was at peace.

THE CHILD OF CANNINGTON

Bridgwater in Somerset. My home was a small cottage, one of a group of three situated a mile or so from the village, pleasantly surrounded by woods and fields. The cottage stood on a large building material and for agricultural lime. Our cottage stood our front gate and you would be over the edge but for a thick thorn hedge that prevented such a thing. This disused quarry within a 'stone's throw' of a quarry's edge. A few paces from machinery, pools of water which mysteriously drained into outcrop of limestone which was related geologically to the Mendip Hills. The rock was quarried for use as roadstone, unknown subterranean passages and an old Home Guard shooting range with spent bullets to be dug out. Not to investigate. There were pieces of derelict, rusty quarry I grew up in Cannington, a village close to the town of was a childhood playground with fascinating things to mention newts to find and trees to climb. Ah bliss!

But I digress.

It had long been known that there was an ancient burial ground set on the hill into which the quarry had progressively been worked. A local antiquarian from time to time on a fine day excavated a grave or two. He was a dowser and by using a combination of ivory pendulum and a system of hand-held wires, located the individual graves. Not that they were difficult to find for there were hundreds within a small area. The well-preserved skeletons lay in shallow graves cut into the limestone bedrock with only a foot or two of light soil covering them. At the quarry's edge itself one could see the occasional protruding broken bone. The graves were purported to be those of Danes and Saxons slain in the battle of Cynwit in 878. There was however, no legal protection for this historic site.

In the early nineteen sixties when I was in my late teens, the old quarry was re-opened. It rapidly became clear that this historic burial ground would soon be destroyed forever. In a two-man rescue bid my twin brother and I dug up some 40 or so skeletons just ahead of the quarrying operations. The bones were stored in cardboard boxes in my father's garage! We recorded as best we could the position and orientation of the graves and alerted the authorities in the form of the Ministry of Works of the situation and a preservation order was issued. A full-scale, official rescue dig was begun with some 400 or so skeletons subsequently recovered and recorded.

Scientific study of the remains revealed that the cemetery was not a legacy of battle, but an ancient community burial ground. The graves covered mainly the Christian period from the 4th to the 7th centuries, although there was evidence of even earlier occupation. In contrast to pagan burials, these Christian graves contained very few grave goods. However, one grave was clearly more prominent than the others. Slabs of stone had been used to form a box-like structure, whereas the other graves were just burial pits. In this special grave were the bones of a young person aged about 16. A well-used path was uncovered leading to the spot, suggesting that it had been especially venerated. Who the young person was we shall never

Last summer I revisited my old childhood haunts. The quarry had again been abandoned and the cemetery long obliterated. On visiting the parish church I was delighted to find that the bones of the young person had been re-buried within the church itself. This provided a fitting memorial to the ancient Christian settlement that later became Cannington. Facing the tomb in the church is an attractive wooden statue of 'The Child of Cannington', the facial features of which are based on the child's skull.

FRENCH DREAMS

We dream of where we might retire

Many readers will know that Valerie and I have decided to sell up here in England and move permanently in retirement to South West France. How could we have such a crazy idea? After all, we have been in Pamber Heath some 28 years and have many friends and acquaintances locally. Furthermore, our eldest daughter, Joanna, has moved back to Tadley with her husband and lives in Burrell's Farm - a quaint thatched cottage. Why France? Were we seduced by all those TV programmes about would-be escapees from Britain to sunnier climes?

It all began several years ago when we thought of moving away from the rather busy and expensive Thames Valley area. Should we venture back to my roots in Somerset or to Val's in Yorkshire? Or should we try, say, rural Dorset or maybe spacious Shropshire? We soon realised that, by moving away from Tadley we would inevitably lose the day-to-day contact with old friends. If so, then why not move further afield, go the whole hog and head for the place one really fancies. We decided that a warm climate would be a distinct advantage in retirement. More time to spend out of doors - less cold and damp for old bones to endure.

In past years our holidays abroad have mostly been spent in Germany or the Canary Islands. The Canaries (part of Spain), just off the coast of Morocco, have a superb, sunny, warm and consistent climate, ideal for holidays, but to live there the whole year around would be too restrictive. Islands can seem small after a while and the landscape is somewhat arid with scant vegetation. France was less well-known to us, yet seemed a good candidate. The richness of culture, scenery, climate, food and drink was beckoning. So many places in France to choose from!

There was no time to visit and inspect them all. We had to make an educated guess from what we could discover from guide books and the like. Thus our interest narrowed down to the department of Lot et Garonne. It lies about three-quarters of the way down France and is some 80 miles inland from the coast at Bordeaux. It is a little south of the Dordogne which is a favourite spot among British ex-pats. The language would be a major challenge.

Having made the 'logical' choice of where to settle down, you then get to the moment of truth. Gulp...Can we really do it? How do we go about it? What are the risks? Is the grass really greener elsewhere? Could it all go horribly wrong? What sort of place do we buy? The climate in South West France is milder than southern England. Winters are generally much shorter with Spring and Autumn being extended. Summers are very hot, much as on the Mediterranean. It still rains of course how else does the vegetation get so lush? Weather conditions are more stable and the locals spend more time out of doors than we do. Do we really have the chance of our own

In the Autumn of 2001 we launched into a big, fact-finding exercise. We bought magazines about France, we borrowed books from the library and we searched the internet for property details. We planned an itinerary and contacted English-speaking estate agents in France. Furthermore, we got stuck into the long task of learning the language. We seriously needed to move on from our hesitant school French to something more fluent. Our first trip was to check up on what we had already gleaned about our chosen area of the country from armchair studies. We wanted to absorb the ambience and find a property and a locality that would appeal to us. Land is much more plentiful in France than the UK, so house prices can be substantially lower. You can get a lot more for your money unless you choose Paris or the Cote d'Azur.

FRENCH DREAMS (Part II)

We set off for S.W. France to see if we really could retire there

Catching the ferry from Portsmouth to Cherbourg, we drove down through France, stopping at Bed & Breakfast locations. The journey was leisurely. I hadn't driven on the wrong side of the road for many years. In any case, we wanted a 'business with pleasure' trip. Having reached our 'is-this-to-be-the-promised-land?' we stayed one week on a farm run by a delightful English couple. They had moved out from Surrey some ten years ago to farm sheep for milk and cheese making. They worked hard, lived simply and enjoyed it. No going back for them!

Having told the estate agents in advance what we were looking for, we were shown a selection of properties to tempt us. It works that way in France. You tell the agents what you are seeking and they will take you to what they feel will meet your requirements. They don't reveal the precise location of the property, or give lots of written details. Generally, the Brits are looking for somewhere to renovate, with old stone walls, exposed beams, open fireplaces, etc. We saw the whole range from utter ruins (properties with woodworm, rot, dilapidation and subsidence), right through to those that had been lovingly restored. Unfortunately, the houses we saw in good condition seemed to be in the wrong place ...perhaps on a windy ridge or next to the local scrap yard!

Here the story takes a twist or two. The day before we were due to return home we popped, on the off-chance, into a local French estate agent who spoke good English. Madame Pons had just time to show us two properties on her books that just might do. The first was a splendid restored farmhouse with a pool, but too isolated. The second was in a pretty little village called Allemans du Dropt, situated on a small river (the Dropt) with a selection of small shops, restaurant, doctor, dentist and a village square.

Allemans is surrounded by rolling countryside, not wild or dramatic, just pleasant farmland, small woods, low hills and restful to the eye.

The house was about ten years old, designed by its owner, a lady schoolteacher, and offered a fair amount of accommodation for its price. It stood on a two-acre plot, had a sunny, southern aspect at the back and the village centre was only a short walk away. It seemed, at the last moment, we had found what we were looking for. We decided pretty quickly that this would suit us nicely. After selling up in England, we could manage some extensions and modifications. Now, about that pool...

The estate agent, a charming woman, advised 'go back home to England, think it over, and then finally decide'. In the meantime, she drew up the legal contract that would make the purchase binding on ourselves. We duly returned home, thought hard, took specialist legal advice and duly signed and returned the contract. At this point the seller decided not to go ahead. She had genuine family reasons to pull out at this late stage. Both she and the estate agent were upset at having let us down. We had to put it down to experience and let it be known that we accepted the outcome with no hard feelings.
