60 years of AWE by Kate Pyne AWE technical historian

For some TADS' members, probably having lived within a 10-mile radius of Aldermaston for a long time and been happily oblivious to 'Over-the-Wire's' many, many successes, the thought off HEAVY atomic science could be a bit daunting. Don't we hear more of AWE's problems? eg 1978, plutonium found in that the lungs of AWRE laundry workers: or the famous/infamous Pangbourne waste pipeline? What about atomic technical data, terra technology (10 to the power of 12), nano technology, gigabytes, gigabits, big bombs then little bombs, atomic and hydrogen; UGT (underground testing); lasers (Orion laser 2009); Christmas Island with its tent city and land crabs: Imperial measure muddled with Metric measure!; enormous libraries; demolition of Boundary Hall; feral cats; protected species in secret places ---- a daunting tip of the iceberg. Then how resilient and disciplined the spirit can be when required! Kate's talk was peppered with her own views and her mirth, and the mirth of a myriad of empathetic (past and present) Aldermaston science brains in the room.

Anyway about 70 of us ENJOYED the tantalising talk, whether some of us could visualise the finer scientific points or not!

The camaraderie was palpable, even though some of us took a sly look round the room see if there were any suspicious spy characters, skulking and gleaning information, though it was all 'DECLASSIFIED' (*The Editor's KGB T-shirt was a joke - honest*).

During WWII there were murmurings and moves by Birmingham University in 1940 to have an atomic bomb. The village of Tadley became 'atomic' in the early 1950s when it was deemed by Ernest Bevin that Britain must have a bomb with a 'Bl...y British Union flag' on it! Enthusiastic scientists, such as one Dr. Bill 'Caesar' Penney, he of the red sports car and 'a lovely man but with a killer instinct', sought a new site, because Fort Halstead, Kent was far too small. Aldermaston Airfield was chosen. Also used were Henry VIII's secure Royal Navy cannon-making site at Woolwich Arsenal (explosives); Foulness Island near Shoeburyness Gunnery Range, Essex (test firings); RAE Farnborough, Hants (bomb casings); Burghfield (Berks) where the bits and pieces were and are assembled; Cardiff (components) till 1995; Windscale (now Sellafield),

Cumbria (decontamination/ waste disposal); and Lab 1 Orfordness (Suffolk) was where the Blue Danube bomb was prepared for tests with its 2 tons of high explosives, and where the first ingot of plutonium was cast in June 1952. (Orfordness is now decommissioned and a National Trust nature site.) Blacknest, Brimpton (Berks) was the home of some apprentices and now houses AWE Forensic Seismology.

Kate said that recently the remaining Blue Danube bomb was parked on its trailer somewhere inside AWE and the 'MoD Plods' put a parking ticket on it. Kate had to pay up!

The mid 1950s saw Aldermaston Airfield preparing plutonium for weapons. The Newbury Weekly News said it was 'something to do with Atomic Energy and High Explosive Research.'

So the Age of Secrecy was born and it continues now in the age of cyber and other terrorism. No local asks what goes on 'Over-the-Wire' ----- just the Ban the Bomb types who get stuck in and dug in.... As some sage said ---- we have had all these years of peace in Great Britain because of our own nuclear capability ---- and Tadley wouldn't be Tadley without AWE.
