The Benedictine Way of Life

Hey! Hey! I couldn't believe my eyes, to see a somewhat ruffled apparition in black emerge from the Gent's facilities at the TADS meeting hall.

Luckily the apparition's black hood was down – as you mustn't approach, speak to, or comment about – a hooded Benedictine monk.

Anyway, Reg. turned out <u>not</u> to be a Benedictine monk, but a professional singer, especially of medieval songs, 7th Century Gregorian Chants (which he transcribes), the 1240 song 'Summer is a cummin in' and lots more Reg. is also a teacher, Schools' Inspector, lecturer, he enjoys boating, cooking and writing, and owns a consultancy and training business. (*He had the audience participating in singing two of his transcribed works! - Ed*).

As well as mentioning The Benedictine Way of Life, he also talked of the Ancient Chinese civilisations and many other cultures.

Benedict of Nursia was a wealthy, scholarly Roman Catholic Italian lad born in AD 480, whose Roman tutors were too much wine, women and song and not ascetic enough for Benedict. His nurse then removed him from these influences and propelled him to a religious establishment nearer his home. He soon rose to be the Abbot and wrote a 72 page rule book. This strict rule book didn't go down well with amoral and immoral brothers and novice monks, etc., and his devotion to performing miracles from the famous Monte Cassino Monastery, caused his underlings to try and poison him Benedict went to Fleury in France. One Abbot, Etienne, from this French monastery had been in contact with Winchester Cathedral. He was made a canon with the permission of the Archbishop of Canterbury. Reg. went to Fleury Abbey too. He obviously has influence and friends in high places

Reg. told us he'd seen the Bayeux Tapestry in Normandy on a visit to France but had naughtily photographed it and got told off.

He had been permitted to handle, (presumably by gloved hand), a tiny 10th Century, 100 page vellum book which had the author-monk's signature on it. There are only three copies left: in Oxford's Bodleian Library, one in Cambridge University and one in Germany.

Benedict, by the way, wasn't a martyr, but died of natural causes circa 543AD, much venerated and revered.

Reg. is obviously a multi-faceted and talented person and we thank him for his vivacity, excellent singing and divergent talk.
