

Donnington Castle, NW of Newbury.

This once-white, ruined castle isn't easily seen from the road. It was once owned by the Chaucer family and home to a Queen of France*. Sadly only the gatehouse remains. The building is not far from the Watermill Theatre.

The East-to-West Newbury A4 Bath Road gives easy access and from the castle one can see south to Beacon Hill and the Oxford Road also. The castle plan is irregular with towers and a gate house (main entrance). Richard II gave Sir Richard Adderbury (or Abberbury) a licence to build it in 1386 – of flint, stone and chalk. Adderbury also held a manor in Old Shoreham, West Sussex. He went with the Black Prince, heir to the throne, to fight in France.

In 1368 an army had gathered first in Northampton and then in France to fight for the king – who became the sovereign at a very early age. Adderbury also built a castle at Bodiam in E. Sussex which is better maintained than the one at Donnington. Adderbury was a very powerful man. We're told he liked Alsation wine, he built a friary, almshouses, a hospital in 1393 and was very religious.....He and the king were very close....for a while.

Donnington Castle had a ditch, not a moat, plus a special oak tree named after Chaucer. In 1399 Adderbury sold Donnington Castle – for an unknown reason.... to Thomas Chaucer, son of Geoffrey of the Canterbury Tales. Chaucer was based at Ewelme, north of Newbury. His daughter Alice, owned other manors and she sold Ewelme where there's a memorial to her, plus a spectacular carved stone work of art. Alice eventually took a <u>third</u> husband: Brandon, Earl of Suffolk, 1396-1450. He met his end by being murdered in 1450.

In 1512 Henry VIII had given Brandon's family the manor, castle and park at Donnington. It was a house to show one's status. The coat of arms was put onto the building but sadly is no longer there. Henry VIII visited the castle in 1516 and 1541 and his daughter, Elizabeth I, briefly owned it.

The castle seems to have been frequently fought over.... In 1644 during the English Civil War it came under seige. After the Second Battle of Newbury when the Royalists vacated the building at dusk they apparently left the King's jewels behind! The castle was then almost demolished.

In the 1960s the Ministry of Works produced a Guide Book to be re-printed every 2 years, but 1978 saw the <u>last</u> book of the castle and indeed, the 20th C hasn't seen a repeat of any fighting!
